Chair's Comments (Martin Lawrence)

When I start to put together this report, I often think it feels like not too much happened over the last year, then I look back at the list of things we have done as a club and feel a bit in awe of everything we have achieved as a club in the last 12 months.

The year from 1 April 2022 to 31 March 2023 feels like 'The Dust settled from the COVID Years'. It was a chance for us to see what we had changed in the new world. Lots still the same, but in other ways lots has changed.

This is also a time of year were we are working on the renewals of membership and that means a time that get literally hundreds of mails about it, the one thing that comes across is the positivity about the club, even from those who are not renewing, often about how this miss it due to injury or having moved away – guess it is too easy to take what we have for granted.

The club only all happens because so many give up time for free to support in so many ways – but more on that later.

I have tried to list the big things for the club below, with our courses, races/events, trips all being a key part of the club year alongside our 'bread and butter' of holding club runs and on an average week we have over 30 runs a week.

But, a lot of the work goes on behind the scenes to make the club, better for our members and one big example form the last year is the club has heavily invested, both in time and funds, in improving our First Aid provision, from a suggestion at last year's AGM about the club buying a De-Fib, we have not only invested in one, but a fully trained Michelle in leading First Aid courses for the club and the first two courses have been delivered to our run leads, with more planned this year.

Also behind the scenes we have done a lot of work to meet the new England Athletics 'club standards' this has meant us reviewing and implementing a whole host of policies that we work with.

It is an honour that the club has been nominated for three awards last year and we won SportMK 'club of the year' and runners up for the other two, this is great recognition of the clubs work.

David Rose has decided not to stand for the Press Officer role for the next year on the club committee, I would like to thank him for all the work he has done for the club.




Number of Runners on runs in the club



Beginners Courses

The beginners' groups started well with 120 booking on the May 22 courses, 100 on the September 2022 courses and 150 on the January 2023 courses. The program is designed to cater to new runners who want to learn the basics of running and improve their fitness levels. We are generally seeing 50% of those graduating at parkrun.

Pre covid our courses were fully booked but post covid that is not happening. It could be that we've already captured all the potential runners in Milton Keynes already, but it appears to be seen generally over sporting occasions that the post covid era is not so well attended.

We have taken the unusual step of reducing the number of courses in the April session and taking the opportunity to re-evaluate the programme and update the emails and website offering in order to revitalise the courses.

Having said that we have a very dedicated set of run leads that are delivering the courses and hopefully providing new members and runners to represent the club. It must be acknowledged at how hard those run leads and helpers have worked to make the courses as successful as they are.

Treasurers Report

Auditors Notes

The club accounts for last year show we were again active on many fronts.

Subscription fees of over £20,000 are up on the previous year's reflecting the growth in membership to over 2.000.

Charity events, before costs, also generated over £20,000. After expenses the contribution we are able to make to the club charity is an impressive £6,938.

The year saw expenditure of nearly £2,000 in training for club members covering first aid, run leadership and coaching. Investment in club equipment was over £5,000, primarily for first aid supplies and equipment.

The net result for the year was a loss of just under £2,000 compared to a surplus of over £2,000 the previous year. The main reasons for the change were the investments in training and equipment.

The cash situation remained strong at the year-end at £56,000. Bear in mind this is the high point of the year as the bulk of subscriptions for the following year have just been received.

All in all, it's been a successful year and the club is, at least in the medium term, in a secure financial position.

As always, a big thank you to Martin for maintaining clear and accurate records of the year's transactions which makes the job of producing the accounts very straightforward.

Different Strokes

I would like to nominate Different Strokes as charity of the year.

Different Strokes is a small national charity based in Milton Keynes that provides peer support, resources and information to working age and younger stroke survivors.

Statutory stroke services often assume that all recovery takes place within six months of a stroke but both physical and emotional recovery can carry on for years. Different strokes recognises that stroke survivors and their family members are the experts in stroke recovery and rehabilitation so regularly consult beneficiaries to make sure their services are relevant and personalised.

Some of the services provided by the charity are:

- Weekday online exercise sessions tailored specifically for stroke survivors
- Online 'meet ups' offering a safe space for stroke survivors to talk openly about experiences and feelings post stroke
- Children resource packs to explain what is happening when mum or dad has had a stroke
- Teen and Young Adult Befriending service offering 1:1 support to young stroke survivors aged 16-25
- 35 support and/or exercise groups around the country including a group in Milton Keynes that meets every week for exercise and a chat

Most of the staff, volunteers and trustees are stroke survivors or have a close personal connection to stroke. In the UK over 100,000 people have a stroke or mini-stroke every year. Most people who have a stroke are over 65 but one in four strokes happen in younger people. As a member of staff for the charity I get to see the difference that the charity can make to stroke survivors. I do shed a tear sometimes hearing individual survivors stories but I am privileged to meet and work with some truly amazing people who overcome adversity to reclaim their lives.
